Keith Primeau is a 15-year veteran of the National Hockey League where he played 909 games with the Detroit Red Wings, Hartford Whalers, Carolina Hurricanes and the Philadelphia Flyers. On May 5, 2000, he ended the longest game in modern NHL playoff history with his goal at 92:01 of overtime against the Pittsburgh Penguins.

Keith suffered his third concussion in game six of the 2003/04 playoffs against the Pittsburgh Penguins. He was unable to return for game seven, which the Flyers eventually won and then he returned to play in game 1 of the next series against the New Jersey Devils.

Primeau suffered four documented concussions during his playing career. And after only nine games into the 2005-06 season, Primeau suffered his fourth concussion which ended his season and eventually his career. As a result of ongoing post-concussion syndrome, he officially announced his retirement on September 14, 2006.

He has been tireless in helping educate people about concussions and has helped make StopConcussions one of the leading platform on the injury in the world.
